Career exploration activities for Grades 2-4, inspired by and to be used in conjunction with:

Goal:

After listening to *How Santa Got His Job*, students will be able to identify the different jobs Santa had, and his career. Students will also be able to identify the interests and skills Santa discovered he had, at each job, and determine if Santa used all of those interests and skills in his career. Similarly, students will identify how expected behaviors and appearances can affect job success (loss), and that Santa uses effort, teamwork, and lifelong learning in his career.


Together the activities addresses the following Academic and Career Plan objectives:

- EC1. Understand the concepts of job and career.
- EC2. Understand that behaviors such as punctuality, courtesy, proper dress and proper language are essential to current and future success.
- EC3. Understand the relationship of individual effort, hard work, and persistence to achievement.
- EC4. Understand the importance of teamwork in working towards a common goal.
- EC7. Recognize the benefits of both individual initiative and teamwork.
- EC8. Recognize that the changing workplace requires lifelong learning.
- EC9. Identify hobbies and interests.
- EC10. Identify career choices through exploration.

Discussion questions that can be used in conjuncture with these activities:

- 1. Santa learned some things about his interests and skills while doing jobs. What are some things you know about your interests and skills?
- 2. What have we learned from Santa's various jobs about punctuality, appropriate dress, being courteous, and using proper language for a particular job?
- 3. How did Santa's initiative in trying jobs and working help him find his career?
- 4. How did teamwork help Santa find his career? How did teamwork help Santa during his career?
- 5. How does Santa use the interests and skills he discovered in his jobs to find his career?
- 6. Why does Santa have to keep learning after he has found his career?*
